Meet This months CRQG Featured Member: Diane Johnson

- How long have you been quilting? I have been quilting for about 2 1/2 years.
- What got you started in quilting? I had always had a desire to learn to quilt but never had the time with raising a family, moving a few times, and holding down a full-time job. When I retired in 2004, I finally had the time to concentrate on some of the things I had always wanted to do. Quilting was first on my list!
- Who taught you how to quilt? I am a self-taught quilter. Once I decided to learn to do it, I purchased a Leisure Arts "how to" book and, with those instructions, hand pieced and hand quilted my first project. Shortly thereafter, I began to participate in Phyllis Schiwal's fiber arts group at the Woodie Fite Center. A multitude of quilters in that group were all members of the Cherokee Rose Quilt Guild and they provided the impetus to join the guild and to continue to learn new and more complicated techniques. What I didn't know before, they patiently taught me.
- What are your favorite quilts to do, i.e appliqué, piecing, paper piecing? I prefer piecing because it is what I know best. However, after the "New York Beauty" workshop we had this year, I have also learned to love the exactness of paper piecing. Appliqué is my least favorite skill. I have taken a few classes in the hope that I will learn to like it more as I learn to do it better.
- What are your favorite colors to work with? When purchasing fabric, I tend to gravitate toward the dark reds, purples, and blues. But I truly enjoy working with all colors.
- Favorite fabrics, ie Batiks, floral, kid prints? I love the look and feel of batiks!
- Favorite Quilt shop? The Red Hen in Marietta is a wonderland of fabric. I could spend days in there and never get bored. At the same time, I love the friendly feel of Qwiltz in Bowden. Now if someone would just open a quilt shop in Douglasville. . .
- If you sew by machine, what kind of machine(s) do you use? At home I use a Pfaff 7570, a gift from my husband, which I owned for 6 years before even trying it. When taking classes or sewing at guild meetings, I use a 1947 Singer featherweight.
- What inspires you to make a particular quilt most often? Fortunately or unfortunately, the picture on a pattern most often inspires me to make a particular quilt. That means I have sometimes tackled patterns that have really made me "stretch" my skills because I didn't have enough sense to avoid very difficult patterns.
- **Favorite quilting book or pattern?** My favorite quilting book is Better Homes and Gardens Complete Guide to Quilting. I use it all the time to review techniques and to learn new ones.
- On average how many quilts do you make in a year? I complete approximately 4 quilts and several smaller projects each year.
- Do you quilt you own quilts or do you send them out? I quilt my own quilts, most of them by hand. I am just now learning to use my sewing machine to quilt projects and hope to take a class in machine quilting soon.
- What quilt related item are you working on right now? Right now I am working on a Texas log cabin quilt that has been a major

Cameras and photos have been with us for almost 200 years. Open those albums and shoe boxes and put your favorite photos on quilts or pillows or any other fabric project you can think of.

This book by Hewlett- Packard Company shows you how. You will need ink-jet printer photos, solid color fabric, freezer paper and a bottle of Bubble Jet Set 2000 to treat your fabric.

This solution can be ordered on line. I found it at Quilts and Fixins 7986 N Main Street, Jonesboro, GA 30326. Phone 770-472-0015.

I cut the fabric in 8 1/2 " strips and soak them in this solution as per the instructions. So instead of a few sheets for #\$12-\$18 dollars a pack, I can make several yards of fabric ready or the printer for the cost of a bottle of jet set about. \$17.00

aMAZing Challenge Quilt Rules

- 1. Cherokee Rose LOGO must appear on the front. The fabric printed logo will be provided or can be pieced.
- 2. Sew at least 4 mitered corners wherever borders or bindings are used.
- 3. Minimum SIZE: MAZE itself at least 24" sq; total QUILT at least 36" square.
- 4. SHAPES: Square or rectangular.
- 5. BACKGROUNDS: Pieced or wholecloth. The a _MAZE_ing quilt must have at least 1 ENTRY point and 1 EXIT point However, multiple entry or exit points are OK. You may enter more than one a _MAZE_ing quilt.

Include the grand/child in the design and/or sewing of the guilt.

Make this an interactive quilting project for the child and you.



Sweatshirt Jacket Supply List and Instructions



CHEROKEE ROSE OUILTERS GUILD

Edie Wilbur will teach us her foolproof way to use a sweatshirt as the foundation for a beautiful quilted jacket. There are lots of options as to how you make the jacket, and you will need to think about them when you purchase fabric for your jacket.

- 1. The easiest approach is to cover the body of the jacket with patchwork, and leave the sleeves plain. This takes less fabric and time, and you can stitch the sleeves with contrasting thread in crosshatch pattern to dress them up. This makes a more casual jacket. Because the sweatshirt shows on the outside with this option, it is important to have the sweatshirt be a color that works well with your fabric. This is a good option for novice quilters.
- The next option is to cover the body in patchwork, and the sleeves in solid pieces of one of the patchwork fabrics. The sweatshirt color does not matter as much, but it is faster and easier than making patchwork for the sleeves.

The last option is to cover both the sleeves and the body with patchwork.

Supplies

A good quality sweatshirt with set-in sleeves at least one size larger than you would normally wear (if in doubt, get one 2 sizes larger). We will be cutting it up, so it is important to have enough to work with. Edie recommends Jerzees, and has had some problems with Hanes for Her because they fit closer and have shorter sleeves. Pick a color that coordinates with your fabrics. Unless you are going to use Option 1 above, the sweatshirt will be the lining, so the color should be okay with your fabrics, but it is not critical. Wash and dry the sweatshirt; get all of its shrinking done before you start this project!

Fabrics – You will need ½ yard of 8 different fabrics or 1 yard of 4 fabrics for finished sizes up through XL. For larger sizes, get 5/8 yard of 8 fabrics or 1 ¼ yard of 4 fabrics. We will be making rail fence block patchwork, and the most striking jackets are those with fabrics that blend into each other.

If you don't put fabric on the sleeves (option 1 above) you will need only 1/3 yard of 8 fabrics or 2/3 yard of 4 f abrics (more for larger sizes).

If you plan to cover the sleeves with a solid piece of fabric, measure the length of your arm, multiply by 2, and buy that length of fabric. (If you use fat quarters, allow extra fabric; this is intended for pieces that run the width of the bolt.)

Thread – for piecing and for guilting the finished product.

Basic sewing supplies – pins, safety pins, rotary cutter, mat, rulers, masking tape, seam ripper, large sharp scissors, seeming machine, energy and a sense of humor! If you have a Shape Cut or Short Cut Ruler (the large square/rectangle ones with the slots set every ½ inch) this is a great time to use it.

Preparing for Class

f you want to, you can cut your strips before the class. To cover the body of the jacket, you will to need cut 6 strips from each of your 8 fabrics or 12 strips from each of your 4 fabrics. The strips must be $1 \frac{1}{2}$ wide, and run from selvedge to selvedge.

f you are very comfortable with your fabric choices, you can sew your strips together with the best ¼ inch seam you can make. If you have 4 fabrics, arrange them so they shade dark to light. If you have 8 fabrics, divide them into 2 groups and shade them dark to light within each group. Make sure the ends are even at one end of the strip set, so that you can cut as many blocks as possible from the strips.

Don't cut up your sweatshirt before the class!!
